FUNDRAISING

We had lots of fun on Halloween with our pop-up cafe and everyone seemed to enjoy all the delicious food and drink that was on offer. Thank you to all involved - preparing / serving the food etc. Despite the horrid weather we raised £151. Then there was the food we provided at the wonderful race night which also seemed to go down really well. A fab night had by all, thank you Rodney for organizing it and all who attended, it was great to see the hall buzzing with excitement. The money raised by (and donated to) the Playfield came to £400.

THE PLAYING FIELD ITSELF

The zip-wire (and a few other pieces of equipment) have been serviced and are back to fully working order. However, the main thing to note is the replacing of the fence!!! This was a massive undertaking that took months of planning and a few weeks of graft but it is now done. The difference is amazing as you can see from the pictures below. Rector's Ramblings for December 2023

This then is Christmas. 2000 years ago the world had gone really wrong.... really, really wrong! God must have despaired and knew that he had got to get his message across. My COUNTDOWN Experience by Wendy Woodward (ex Chedzoy Villager)

I have been watching the Channel 4 programme "COUNTDOWN" on & off since it started more than 40 years ago. Since retiring I watch it most days & enjoy the challenge. I applied to go on the programme some time ago and after a telephone audition I was accepted as a contestant.

I was asked if I could attend a recording on the 17th May at Media City, Salford. You are allowed to have one companion as support, so Richard came with me. The Production company paid for us to stop at The Holiday Inn Express for 2 nights & paid the equivalent of a return train ticket for travel expenses. They record for 3 days at a time & each day covers a week of programmes. They sent several guidance notes about the recordings. The main thing was, you had to have 5 changes of tops, in case you appear in more than one programme. There were several rules about colours & patterns, which do not appear well on camera. I also had to fill in a questionnaire about me & my interests, etc. which was used by Colin Murray for the introduction.

We had to be at the studio for 8.30am, as I was the first recording of the day. We had to wait in the Green Room until we were called to the Studio. Since COVID there has not been an audience, so Richard had to wait from the wings. I was up against Mark from South Molton, who had won 2 games before me. It was a bit nerve racking when the music & recording started. Colin was lovely & put you at ease & chatted in a friendly way before the programme started. Neil Delamare, an Irish comedian, was the guest in Dictionary Corner.

The recording started pretending to be 21st July. The programme ran, as you see it on TV, except that everything had to stop for the studio staff to turn the letters board around to the numbers one. The break for the adverts was very short. I had a good game and managed an 8-letter word. If I had remembered how I had done a numbers round (that I had not written down) I would have won, but it went to the crucial conundrum which I did not get.

The atmosphere was very friendly & pleasant. I came away with a Goody Bag (Countdown Tote Bag, clock, pen and mug). I was told that I was not allowed to tell anyone how I got on until after the programme was broadcast. I did not know what had been edited out until I watched the programme.

It was an interesting experience. Colin was very nice and said that it was a shame that Mark and I had come against each other, as I might have gone further. It is pure chance who you are going to play against. I was just relieved that I was not playing a teenage "Whiz Kid", who read dictionaries as a hobby and knew obscure words!!!

There's a famous quote from Rev Sydney Smith "It is the greatest of all mistakes to do nothing because you can only do a little. Do what you can."


From as little as a couple of hours a fortnight and less than a week's quality training, you could be making purposeful contact with a young person and make a positive difference for them through outings, conversations, activities and more...

Route1 have two volunteering opportunities: Independent Visitor and Advocate.

Independent Visitors are volunteers who befriend and spend time with a child or young person who is in the care of the Local Authority. We will match your interests and skill set with a young person who will best suit your support. You and the young person have the freedom to decide what you do, how you do it, to build a meaningful friendship.

One young person with an Independent Visitor said: "Things I get from my IV relationship... is space from the world, where I can have an open and honest conversation with, at first a stranger, that becomes a friend. I would be happy to say it is a really good experience!"

An Advocate is an independent person who can offer one-toone support to children and young people to have their voice heard when meetings are taking place concerning their wellbeing. It's the role of the Advocate to speak up for the young person, make them aware of their rights, listen to them and represent their views, wishes and feelings.



Your volunteering can be arranged to suit your availability. Your life experience will be highly valued, and you will be trained and supported in developing key skills.



Council Matters

For detailed information relating to Parish Council matters, please visit chedzoyparishcouncil.gov.uk where there is a wealth of information. Some items that may be of interest

Speedwatch – Still awaiting Highways to get the necessary signing up to scratch.

Somerset Councillors Report – Overspend for this year currently running at **£27.3 million.** Estimated overspend for the year 2024/25 is **£100 million.** It is just a matter of time before the Government Commissioners are brought in. All non – statutory services will be cut. Parish Councils will have to fund some services through their precepts.

Localised Flooding – There was a feeling that localised flooding events were occurring more regularly. The Clerk was asked to obtain from the Somerset Councillors the state of Readiness of Somerset's Flood Defences.

Mark Holder has been co-opted onto the Parish Council to fill the current vacancy.



Public consultation on budget setting

A public consultation on the Somerset Council's budget has been launched. It will offer a chance for people to have their say in light of the financial emergency, which was called in November. It's open to all, and we are encouraging our Somerset communities, residents, businesses, stakeholders, and partners to take part. The consultation highlights several discretionary services which could be redesigned, reduced, or even stopped. It will close on 22 January 2024.

Please participate and send your views in. Even, just visit the site to get some idea of the absolutely dire straits that Local Government Finance is in. It may mean the Parish has to pay for its' own litter bin clearing, road sweeping and grass cutting to name but a few. The Parish may have to contribute to keeping the recycling sites open, bus services, etc. Do you receive any services from Somerset Council that are planned to be cut? Please let your Parish Clerk (Chris Fry) know, or any Parish Councillor. Volunteers, self-help and community spirit are to be more important than ever in the next few years.

What is OLIO?

Came across this on my travels and know that several Chedzoy residents already take advantage of this scheme. Thought it might be useful.

Olio also works with businesses to redistribute their unsold or unserved food. We pair trained volunteers with local shops, cafes and offices who pick up whatever food is left at the end of each day. They then add it to the app for people living nearby to request and collect. That way, we get spare food on tables, rather than it going in the bin.

The problem of global overconsumption is, to state the obvious, a big one. It can be hard as an individual to feel you can make a difference. But contrary to the popular narrative, what we do as individuals does count. It was billions of small actions that caused the climate crisis. So by the same logic, billions of small actions can help to get us out of it.

When most people think about playing their part in helping the environment, they think of recycling... but we absolutely cannot recycle our way out of this mess. We need a brand new model of consumption — one where when we want to consume, the first thing we do is utilise the resources that already exist in our local communities. In other words: sharing instead of shopping needs to become our default model of consumption to reduce the number of 'new' items coming in to replace perfectly good ones that are simply being discarded.

Did you know that Chedzoy has at least 2 "Food Waste Heroes"? This is not out of date food, just stuff that the supermarkets cannot get rid of and its all FREE!!! Sooner than put it straight to landfill, why not see if local communities can benefit. Google OLIO, download the app and start saving money without travelling outside the village. 
