ST MARY'S CHURCH HONOURS AND REMEMBERS QUEEN ELIZABETH by

It was with deep sorrow that Chedzoy PCC received the news that Her Majesty the Queen had died. Her Coronation and landmark Jubilees have been moments of great community celebration and many past and present residents have had the honour of service to her through their working lives or as part of the armed forces; some had even met her. On Thursday 8th September, as the announcement was made, when St Mary's Church would normally have been locked for the night, the church remained open with the new lights left on, for private prayer until night fell.

As many of you know, the lighting in the nave of St Mary's was in desperate need of refurbishment but thanks to a generous donation of £500 from POP IN for a Pint we had sufficient funds and the work was carried out only last month.

So many protocols were swiftly and respectfully observed; flags around the village were lowered, a photo of the Queen and a simple prayer, a book of condolence and a place to leave floral tributes were set up in church, and on the following day Revd Jane Sutton spent the morning with visitors to the church, in quiet reflection and to hear the muffled tolling of the church bell for a full hour at noon – thanks to Lesley Peppin, Tower Captain, and Amanda Lane. Amanda Triggol was also in the Tower observing how it was done.

The following two Sundays' Church services were the Holy Communion specially set for the period of national mourning by the Church of England for the Queen led by Revd Jane Sutton; solemn, unique, memorable, comforting and faith-centred.



What's in a name? Just how did some of our familiar ballroom dances get their name?

Did The Charleston dance originate in Charleston town? Was the foxtrot named after a furry animal on the run? Has the Tango something to do with a fizzy drink?

The Charleston

The Charleston is named after the harbour city of Charleston, South Carolina. The rhythm was popularized in mainstream dance music in the USA by a 1923 tune called "The Charleston". Danced by rebellious women known as 'flappers' during Prohibition, it was considered immoral!

The Foxtrot

Vaudeville performer Harry Fox added slower steps to a quick two-step routine back in 1914. It became known as "Fox's Trot". It soon become the epitome of ballroom grace and style that was immortalised by Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers. The Foxtrot had arrived!

The Ballroom Tango

The Tango evolved about 1880 in the lower-class districts of **Buenos Aires**. The name is derived from the Spanish word for drum, *tambor*, and was mispronounced by lower-class inhabitants to become tambo, then tango. It is said that the lady held a rose in her teeth to counteract the smell from her gaucho partner! The **Argentine Tango** is less formalised than it's ballroom equivalent.

The Paso Doble

Unlike the other Latin dances, the Paso Doble does not have African roots coming directly from Spain becoming popular during 1930s. It's name means two step and is associated with the bullfight. Typically, one dancer is the matador and the other the cape.

Salsa

The name Salsa means 'sauce' - and it's not just a reference to the dance's sexy nature. It first appeared in a song in the 1940s about eating sausages! After 1950s US D.J.s picked it up, announcing songs that "contained salsa", it gradually became to mean both a style of music and a dance style.

The Samba

The name derives from a Bantu word meaning to pray and the dance and the music originated as a way of calling forth the gods. The ultimate party dance with lots of Latin rhythms and a real flavour of Mardi Gras.

The Jive

The jive is a dance style that originated in the US from African Americans. Popular since the early 1920s there, the G.I.s brought it to Europe in the 1940s. Versions include the Lindyhop, Jitterbug, Rock 'n' Roll and Swing. The name of the dance comes a form of African-American vernacular slang. The Lindyhop was named in honour of the first solo flight across the Atlantic by Charles Lindbergh in 1927 -"Lindy's hop".

The Rumba

The word "rumba" comes from the Spanish verb "rumbear" which means to go dancing, party and to have a good time. It is said to be the forerunner of the Cha Cha and has a rather risque reputation

The Cha Cha Cha

There is some debate about the origin of the name. It could have come from the Haitian word for a bell-like musical instrument, or that it represents the sound of sandals slapping against the floor. Based on the Rumba but with the addition of the triple step (cha cha cha).

Whichever style of dance you may like to do - it's considered one of the best forms of exercise, not only for your fitness levels but for improved mental well-being and - of course - is lots of fun!

Walter Raleigh Lived in My House - by John Paige

The rectory in Chedzoy was built circa 1625 and divided into 2 properties around 1964; it is now Crosstree House, where I live with Karen, and the Old Rectory, where my lovely neighbours Jonathan and Marion live. Whilst undertaking a little research on the Battle of Sedgemoor I found some information that I thought quite interesting (Mr Stephen Fry please note!): a gentleman named Walter Raleigh used to live here! Here's a little about this somewhat unlucky gentleman.

Walter Raleigh or Ralegh (b. 1586 d. 10 October 1646) an English divine¹, was rector of Chedzoy from 1620 to 1646 and Dean of Wells from 1641. He was the second son of Sir Carew Raleigh of Downton, Wiltshire the elder brother of Sir Walter Raleigh (favourite courtier of Queen Elizabeth I). His mother was Dorothy, widow of Sir John Thynne, of Longleat, Wiltshire. Between 1620 and 1623 Raleigh married Mary (Maria), daughter of Sir Ralph Gibbs.

A staunch royalist and a member of Lord Falkland's circle, Raleigh suffered grievously during the civil war. While he was attending the king, his rectory-house at Chedzoy was plundered by the parliamentarians, his property stolen, his cattle driven away, and his wife and children expelled from their home (there's an idea!). Mrs Raleigh took refuge at Downton (not in The Abbey - that was the Earl of Grantham silly!), where she was joined by her husband. In the western counties, for some time, fortune was favourable to the king, so Raleigh was able to return to Chedzoy. He continued to live in the rectory in safety until the defeat of lord George Goring (a Royalist), at Langport in 1645. Raleigh then fled to Bridgwater (never wise!), and on the fall of the town on 21 July 1645, he surrendered to the parliamentarians. From Bridgwater, he was imprisoned in his rectory here in Chedzoy, but on account of his weakness was allowed to live in free custody (house arrest). The departure of Fairfax and Cromwell was for him the beginning of new troubles. It is said that Henry Jeanes, who was anxious to secure the rectory for himself, carried Raleigh off to Ilchester and there had him lodged in the county gaol. (Jeanes was a clergyman and I have found it written that eventually he "received" the rectory in Chedzoy but there is no record of his being rector of Chedzoy). From Ilchester, Raleigh was removed to Banwell, and then on to the deanery in Wells. Here, Raleigh was entrusted to the care of David Barrett, a shoemaker (I'm talking cobblers), but Barrett treated him very badly and he was eventually mortally wounded in a scuffle. According to Simon Patrick (Bishop of Ely), Raleigh "was murdered while attempting to screen from Barrett's impudent curiosity a letter that he had written to his wife". He died on 10 October 1646 and was buried in the choir of Wells Cathedral before the dean's stall; no inscription marks his grave. Raleigh's eldest son George attempted to bring Barrett to justice; I cannot find details of the outcome. A priest-vicar of Wells named Standish was arrested for having permitted the burial of the dean in the cathedral, and "was kept in custody to the hour of his death".

Among Raleigh's friends were Lucius Cary, second viscount Falkland Henry Hammond, William Chillingworth, and Edward Hyde, earl of Clarendon. Now I live here; I have no notable societal friends other than the eminent villagers of Chedzoy.

¹ Anglican "divines" are clergy of the Church of England whose theological writings have been considered standards for faith, doctrine, worship, and spirituality, and whose influence has permeated the Anglican Communion in varying degrees through the years.

Chedzoy Stitchers by Liz Rhodes

September 16th Chedzoy Stitchers and Crafters spent the day experimenting using natural dyes collected locally from hedgerows, out of our gardens or ingredients we had in our cupboards. We used red cabbage, ivy, nettles, onions skins, mix hedgerow berries, walnuts, turmeric. We used a variety of different natural fabric, old cotton tables cloths, pieces of a silk shirt, shrunken wool jumper that had felted, knitting wool, silk sewing thread etc. It was interesting how differently they took on the colour creating different shades from the same colour pot.

If you're interested in coming along we usually meet on the 1st-3rd Thursday and the 1st Saturday of the month. It's from 10am-12.30pm, £3 a session with tea, coffee and biscuits provided you enjoy doing. It's a friendly group who help each other out, just bring along what you enjoy doing.
