Amy's Recipe by Amy Kimber

Gin & Tonic Drizzle Cakes

Makes 1 loaf cake or 24 Cup Cakes

For the Cakes

175g Self Raising Flour

175g Castor Sugar

3 Eggs

175g Butter

2 tbsp Gin

1 tsp Baking Powder

1 Lime, zest only

For the Drizzle

125g Caster Sugar

125ml Tonic Water (we prefer the lime flavoured one)

3 tbsp Gin

For the Icing

2 tbsp Gin

100g Icing Sugar

A few drops of water to mix to the consistency you want

Preheat the over to 180C, grease and line either a loaf tin with baking paper or a cupcake tin with cases.

In a large bowl beat together the butter and sugar until fluffy and then gradually beat in the eggs. Mix in the flour, baking powder, gin and lime zest. Spoon into the cases and bake – approx. 50 mins for a loaf cake or 15-20 mins for cupcakes – until a skewer comes out clean.

Whilst the cake/s are baking make the drizzle by gently heat the caster sugar and tonic water in a small pan, stirring until the sugar dissolves, then boil for 1 mins. Put 3 tbsp of the syrup into a small bowl and mix with 3 tbsp of gin and put to one side.

As soon as the cake/s come out of the over makes some small holes in them with a skewer and drizzle over the syrup mixture. Leave to cool on a wire rack.

For the icing mix the ingredients all together and drizzle over the cake/s sparingly.

ST MARY'S CHURCH YARD by Carole Edmunds

If you take a walk through the church yard you may have noticed a circle of delicate little purple flowers in the round flower bed just inside the the gate. Nothing had been planted; the plants appeared and flower heads formed as the Spring bulbs faded, so I left them to grow. They are corn-cockle - once a common weed in fields until the 1950s but now rarely seen.

With most wheat being sown in autumn and harvested before corn-cockle flowers appear or set seed and the cereal is better cleaned, it was thought to be extinct in the UK as recently as 2014, when a single specimen was found in Sunderland by the National Trust. The long-dormant seeds in the church yard were most likely triggered into germination by last summer's heat, followed by extreme cold and general disturbing of the soil when planting bulbs and polyanthus in the border.



Enjoy them but do not touch! In common with many popular garden plants, experts tell us that all parts of the corn-cockle are poisonous. It has come in for some bad press when BBC Countryfile controversially included the seeds in their wildflower mix. The intension is to leave the plants to flower even though their one metre height means they tower over the other low-level bedding and are blown untidily about. The seeds will be collected in due course for sowing with other wild flowers.



Snippets from the Minutes

Chedzoy Climate Change Project

Over 2000 trees have been planted in Chedzoy

Bus Subsidy.

This has been extended at the £2 maximum single fare until the end of October 2023 and thereafter at £2.50 until October 2024. There is a push by the several bus companies operating throughout Somerset to introduce a uniform season ticket scheme.

Westonzoyland Road.

There are confirmed plans to install a new speed limit to replace the national one currently in place.

Chedzoy Lane/A39 cycle way entrance.

This is scheduled for completion by Autumn 2023. The appreciation of the Parish Council was expressed to Carole Edmunds for her work in highlighting this issue.

Pot holes.

£4.8 million has been ring-fenced specifically to improve the pothole problem in Somerset.

Allotments -

Management and letting procedures. It was generally felt matters regarding this needed reviewing and it was decided to take up the offer from a tenant to give the councillors a guided tour of the allotment site, and the Clerk was asked to arrange for this to take place.

Budget projected overspend 2022/2023.

As at month nine the deficit remained at £24.6 million. At year end any overspend will have to be covered from reserves.

The Parish Council is very keen to hear from Residents relating to a Village Design Statement. If you have any views at all, about the future development of Chedzoy, please let a Parish Councillor know. Without a Village Design Statement, it will be very difficult to oppose any future development. So, if you think we should have more social housing, more heavy industrial units, better bus services, access to NHS services in the village or even perhaps a village shop, please let your local Councillor know. If you don't tell us, we don't know what you are thinking. If we don't get in early, it might be too late to influence any planning decisions in the future.

EUROVISION

Something new for the Village. Eurovision hit the West's City of Culture (Chedzoy!) and what a night it was. Participants were allocated countries that were taking part. They were then challenged to not only attend in that country's National Dress, (or some sort of attire where they could be identified as supporting that country) but also supply some food associated with their country.

Boy, not only were there some really awesome costumes but those Chillies were extra spicy!!!

Prizes for Best Costumes, Raffle and donations meant that £564 was handed over to UNICEF for Ukraine.
